Activities for the day: Fishing (catch and release), target shooting with air pellet guns, shotguns, crossbows, compound bows, wildlife education, crafts, visiting with other people with disabilities about their outdoor adventures and activities, etc.

- At the fishing hole: assist with hooking worms, casting the rod, removing the hook and releasing the fish
- At the archery range: (for qualified volunteers only) assist with nocking and sighting the arrow, aid in pulling, security of the bows/arrows.
- At the firing range: (for qualified volunteers only) assist in instruction, positioning, loading, firing, unloading and security of the firearms.
- At the various seminars and crafts stations: assist in getting individuals in position to participate and to provide hands-on assistance (if needed) in their creations.
